



Syllabus: Contemporary Math

Course Number: MATH 1332HYB

Instructor Information

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Course Description- This course is a hybrid class and will meet every Monday and Wednesday for eight weeks. This course is for **Non-STEM** students.

Student Learning Outcomes for the Course

1. Apply the language of notation and sets.
2. Determine the validity of an argument or statement and provide mathematical evidence.
3. Solve problems in mathematics of finance.
4. Demonstrate fundamental probability/counting techniques and apply those techniques to solve problems.
5. Interpret and analyze various representations of data.
6. Demonstrate the ability to choose and analyze mathematical models to solve problems from real-world settings, including, but not limited to, personal finance, health literacy, and civic engagement.

Student Requirements for Completion of the Course and Due Dates (refer to class schedule)

Homework assignments are to be completed in the online resource *MyLab Math* according to the accompanying schedule. Your **lowest 5 homework grades** will be dropped at the end of the semester. The best browsers to use are **Chrome and Firefox**. To earn credit, homework assignments should be completed by midnight (see class assignment schedule). You will have unlimited attempts per question and you will not receive any credit for assignments completed after the due date. **You, the student, are** responsible for all assignments regardless of whether you are present at the time of assignment. **Any missed assignment will be recorded as a zero.** At the end of the semester your **3 lowest homework grades** will be dropped and will not count towards your homework average. Even though the homework is online, you should still work your problems on paper. Quizzes may be given on a regular basis and will be included in your homework average. **This is a hybrid class; therefore, you may be required to watch videos before you attend class, take notes from those videos, and complete a quiz during class.** Students are expected to participate in face-to-face classes by being prepared for class, engaging in group activities, joining class discussions, and explaining their work to others.

Tests – All tests will either be taken online using *MyLab Math* or in class on paper. You must have a web browser and operating system which supports *MyLab Math*.

Students MUST take the exam during the time period given by the instructor.

Test 2: Chapter 3

Test 3: Chapter 10

Test 4: Chapters 11, 12

Final Exam – There will be a multiple choice comprehensive final exam given the last day(s) of the semester in our regular classroom. A Scantron(Form 882-E) is required and can be purchased from the bookstore. A practice final exam will be available.

Student Assessment

You have opportunity to earn points in the following 3 areas. Your final grade will be determined by the corresponding percentages.

(1) Homework	15%
(2) Chapter Tests	60%
(3) Final Exam	25%

Final Grade = $0.15 \times \text{homework average} + 0.6 \times \text{chapter test average} + 0.25 \times \text{final exam average}$

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Computer Requirement Policy

Students are required to have a computer with Internet access for classes. The computer must be an actual computer – smart phones, iPads, Androids, Chromebooks, etc., are not acceptable substitutes because they lack software compatibility necessary to complete all assignments and tests. Financial costs for the necessary equipment and internet access are the responsibility of the student.

Students needing to purchase a computer may do so through the Texarkana College Bookstore. Systems purchased through the bookstore meet or exceed all requirements, are competitively priced, and may be purchased using financial aid funds. If the system is purchased through another source, it is the student's responsibility to ensure the system meets all requirements.

Computer systems requirements:

- Webcam, microphone, and speakers or headphones
- Windows 10 or a recent version of Mac OS (minimum Sierra). Windows 10 S mode is not supported
- Hardware capable of running Microsoft Teams (free download) and supports multi-media playback
- Support for Chrome or Microsoft Edge – Note: Firefox, Safari, or other browsers may not work on all TC applications
- Able to run Microsoft Office which will be provided free to TC students
- Adobe Reader or another PDF viewer
- Antivirus software such as Windows Defender or another 3rd party anti-virus solution
- The Respondus Lockdown browser may be used for taking tests; therefore, the system must be capable of running this software. Most newer systems that meet other specifications should work.

Students should regularly backup content to prevent loss of coursework due to hardware failure. Backup copies of documents and other coursework may be placed on OneDrive cloud storage. OneDrive is

Absentee Policy (<https://catalog.texarkanacollege.edu/article/absentee-policy/>)

Texarkana College's absentee policy allows instructors to withdraw a student from a course due to excessive absences. The course content will be delivered through face-to-face interaction in the classroom and through **MyLab Math** video. See detailed class schedule. Face to face meetings are required for attendance. If a student leaves and returns during face-to-face class before the class is over, he/she **may** be considered absent or tardy. **Three tardies constitute one absence.**

A student should not stop attending a class without formally withdrawing from the course by the institutions published Last Day for Students to Drop. If a student stops attending class after the published Last Day for Students to Drop, the student **may** receive a grade of "F" in the class. The instructor will submit the last date of attendance for students receiving a grade of "F" or "W".

Withdrawal from a course(s) **may** affect a student's current or future financial aid eligibility. Students should consult the Financial Aid Office to learn both short and long term consequences of a withdrawal. If you miss the first day of class, the student must complete an Enrollment Verification Activity (homework assignment) and correspond with the instructor within the first week of class; otherwise, the student **may** be dropped for not having attended.

Faculty members **are not** obligated to provide opportunities for students to make-up missed assignments and tests as a result of a student's absence from class.

Maximum Allowable Absences

After official registration, the following number of unexcused absences will be the maximum allowable before a student **may** be dropped from the class. **Since this class is a Hybrid Course, an instructor may withdraw a student from a course for having 3 recorded absences.**

Excused Absences

A student's absence due to school trips and/or school business will not be counted against a student's allowable number of absences. Military duty and absences for Holy Days (FBD LEGAL) are covered in a separate section of the catalog and the student handbook. These are the only excused absences that are considered by Texarkana College. **Responsibility for work missed for any absence is placed on the student.** Instructors are required to allow students to make up work missed if the absence is due to military duty* or religious holy days when students follow the correct notification procedures.

Instructors are not required to allow students to make up work for absences due to other reasons.

**Students interested in Health Occupations should check with the division chair prior to entering the program.*

Make-up Policy

There will be no make-up exams for major tests. Any test missed will be recorded as a zero. **Any student missing 2 major tests may be dropped from the course.** If your final exam grade is higher than one of your chapter test grades, the final exam grade will replace the lower test score. Homework assignments not completed by the assigned due date will be recorded as a zero. At the end of the semester **your 3 lowest homework grades will be dropped** and will not count towards your homework average.

Class Behavior

There will be a zero tolerance policy for any behavior that is a disruption to virtual classroom learning. This includes ANY use of vulgar language or rude behavior toward instructor or any other student in the class. This also includes disruptive cell phone usage during our virtual class time! Please be considerate of others who are trying to learn.

A student may be dropped from the course for any of the following reasons:

1. Missing 3 classes
 2. Missing 2 major tests
 3. Any breach of classroom conduct (see student handbook)
- *Being dropped from the course could affect your financial aid.
