Jonathan Swift's Gulliver's Travels Study Guide

Characteristics of Nineteenth Century Romanticism:

- Ideas of democracy, individual rights, and a belief in the limitless possibilities inherent in change and progress
- Spontaneity, imagination, and originality emerged as valued forces through which the individual could connect with universal truths and communicate those truths to others
- Influences seen in literature, the growing sense that societal institutions corrupt human nature

Jonathan Swift (1667-1745):

- Irish author and satirist
- Most of his writings were published under pseudonyms
- Best remembered for his 1726 book. *Gulliver's Travels*

Satire:

- The use of humor, irony, or exaggeration, even ridicule to expose and criticize politics, people, topical issues, etc.
- Typically appearing in plays, novels, film, editorials, social media, etc.

- 11. What does Gulliver "do" inside his confinement house that he regrets and determines to do outside in the future?
- 12. How does Gulliver win the favor of the Lilliputians?
- 13. What is the translation of the term: "Quinbus Flestrin"?
- 14. What are some of the items discovered on Gulliver's person when he is searched?
- 15. What item do the men searching Gulliver assume must be "the god that he worships"?
- 16. What are the conditions upon which the King agrees to release Gulliver?
- 17. Name the great metropolis within which the emperor's majestic palace may be found.
- 18. Who are enemies of the Lilliputians? On what island do they reside?
- 19. What is the ridiculous reason behind the war in which Lilliput is currently engaged?
- 20. How does Gulliver end the war?
- 21. What is Gulliver's punishment if he is charged with treason?

Points of Satire:
