Study Guide for Pushkin and *The Queen of Spades*

Aleksandr (Alexander) Pushkin 1799-1837:

- 1. Pushkin is Russia's greatest poet, known as the greatest influence of Russian literature in the 19th and 20th centuries. He is known as a poet, playwright, and novelist.
- 2. He had a difficult childhood, often abandoned by his mother because of her social obligations, and his father was domineering and easily irritated. His first language was French because he was raised almost entirely by his French nursemaids.
- 3. He wrote approximately 130 poems while at school. Most of his poems were not published because his topics were considered inappropriate. In 1817, he recited his controversial poem, "Ode to Liberty" upon his graduation from the Lyceum. (Later, in 1825, this same poem would be found among the belongings of rebels against the Tsar, Nicholas I) This poem and others he had written in his youth led to his exile.
- 4. From **1820-1823**, he was **exiled** to the south of Russia because of the political humor expressed in his writings.
- 5. Following his exile, he married Nathalie Goncharova. Their marriage produced three children (four children are documented in some biographies), but they were not happy. Nathalie was very beautiful and had many admirers, including her brother-in-law and the Tsar.
- 6. Pushkin died dueling one of his wife's lovers. He was shot in the abdomen on January 26, 1837 and died three days later.
- 7. He is most famous for his novel *Eugene Onegin*. Many of his works have been used to inspire Russian composers. *The Queen of Spades* was used to inspire an opera by Tchaikovsky. The story has also been produced in filmed many times.
- 8. *The Queen of Spades* is sometimes called a short story, but it is considered a novella because it is written in chapters.
