During this semester for Anatomy and Physiology II, we will be using an open source textbook developed by Rice University. You can purchase a copy of the textbook at the TC Bookstore, or you can download it as a PDF to your computer, tablet, phone, etc. for free from the Rice OpenStax website.

- A. Print—allows you to order a copy from OpenStax. You can also purchase a copy at the TC Bookstore
- B. PDF—This format can be read on most tablet devices like iPad, kindle, and most smart phones. You can select high resolution which takes up more space and takes longer to download or lower resolution.
- C. Web view—you can read the book live on the web from your computer or device connected to the internet. The book does not download.
- D. EPUB—another format for popular mobile devices such as the NOOK.

Student Learning Outcomes for the Course

1. Identify and describe the structural features of the endocrine system and explain the functional roles of hormones on their tissues.
2. Identify and describe the components of blood and explain their functional roles.
3. Identify and describe the structural features of the heart and blood vessels and explain their functional role.
4. Identify and describe the structural features of the respiratory system and explain their functional roles in ventilation.
5. Identify the structural features of the lymphatic system and explain its role in fluid balance, fat absorption, and defense.
6. Identify and describe structural features of the digestive system and explain their roles in digestion, absorption, and defecation.
7. Identify the structural features of the urinary system and explain their functional roles in urine formation and excretion.
8. Describe the physiology of homeostatic mechanisms that control fluid and electrolyte balance.
9. Define buffer systems and explain their roles in acid-base balance.
10. Identify and describe structural features of the male and female reproductive systems and explain their roles in reproduction and inheritance.

Attendance Policy

Roll will be taken each class. It is recommended that students contact the instructor if missing a class is necessary. A student with 4 absences may be dropped from the course for lack of attendance. If an enrolled student stops attending class and chooses to receive an F, the last date they attended will be listed on the final grade sheet and they will most likely have to pay back money received from grants or scholarships.

Absentee Policy

Texarkana College's absentee policy allows instructors to withdraw a student from a course due to excessive absences. If a student leaves and returns during class or leaves the class before the class is over, he/she may be considered absent. Three tardies constitute one absence.

Faculty members are not obligated to provide opportunities for students to make-up missed assignments and tests as a result of a student's absence from class. A student should not stop attending a class without formally withdrawing from the course by the institutions published Last Day for Students to Drop. If a student stops attending class after the published Last Day for Students to Drop, the student may receive a grade of "F" in the class. The instructor will submit the last date of attendance for students receiving a grade of "F" or "W".

Withdrawal from a course(s) may affect a student's current or future financial aid eligibility. Students should consult the Financial Aid Office to learn both short and long term consequences of a withdrawal.

EXCUSED ABSENCES

A student's absence due to school trips and/or school business will not be counted against a student's allowable number of absences. Military duty and absences for Holy Days (FBD LEGAL) are covered in a separate section of the catalog and the student handbook. These are the only excused absences that are considered by Texarkana College. Responsibility for work missed for any absence is placed on the student. Instructors are required to allow students to make up work missed if the absence is due to military duty or religious holy days when students follow the correct notification procedures. Instructors are not required to allow students to make up work for absences due to other reasons.

MAXIMUM ALLOWABLE ABSENCES

After official registration, the following number of unexcused absences will be the maximum allowable before a student may be dropped from the class.

Make-up Policy

Make-up exams should not be required. One make-up exam for full credit will be given. If a second make-up exam must be administered to the same student, it will be worth 75% of the actual score on the exam. Make-up exams may differ in format from the original test. All make-up exams will be recorded as a zero until they are made up. This policy will also apply for in-class quizzes. Assignments that have a specific due date will have points deducted if they are late. All make-up grades must be arranged with the instructor during office hours or taken in the testing center on campus.

Class Behavior

There will be a zero tolerance policy for any behavior that is disruptive and prevents or deters from classroom learning. This behavior includes, but is not limited to, any use of vulgar language or rude behavior towards the instructor or any other student in the class. Violation could result in being asked to leave the class, withdrawal from the course, and/or investigation by the Dean of Students.

Cell Phone Policy

All cell phones will be turned off and kept out of sight in class. If any phones are out or on your desk during testing, I will assume you are cheating. There will be no texting while lecture and discussion are taking place. If you cannot abide by this policy, you will be asked to leave. No phones are allowed on a student's desk when a graded test is being reviewed by the class.

It is the student's responsibility to know and comply with the instructor's policy and to contact the instructor to make up missed work.
