Student Learning Outcomes for the Course

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate understanding and knowledge of properties of functions, which include domain, range, operations, compositions, and inverses.
2. Recognize and apply polynomial, rational, radical, exponential, and logarithmic functions and solve related equations.
3. Apply graphing techniques.
4. Evaluate all roots of higher degree polynomials and rational functions.
5. Recognize, solve, and apply systems of linear equations using matrices.

Student Requirements for Completion of the Course and Due Dates

Homework/Quizzes— Homework assignments and quizzes are to be completed in the online resource **MyMathLab** according to the accompanying schedule. Any changes in due date will be posted on MyMathLab. At the end of the semester your lowest 3 homework grades will be dropped and will not count towards your homework average.

Major Tests— There will be a total of **5 or 6 chapter tests**. All chapter tests will be taken online in a proctored setting.

Final Exam— A comprehensive final exam will be administered. The final exam must be taken online at your proctored setting at the end of the semester on the date scheduled by your proctor. *I will replace your lowest test score with your final exam grade if it improves your final average.

*NOTE: Calculators and the College Algebra Formula Sheet are allowed on all work unless otherwise instructed.

This course may be designed as a hybrid course or as an asynchronous (WEB) course. In the hybrid format, the course will meet in-person, synchronously through TEAMS, and/or asynchronously online for some material and will include some video-based instruction created by the instructor. In the web format, all content will be delivered through asynchronous video-based instruction created by the instructor. Either way, you will be

responsible for creating a work schedule for yourself, keeping up with all of the reading, assignments, online tests, etc. It takes a fair amount of self-discipline to do well in a hybrid or online course. So make a plan, and stick to it so that you complete all of your work by the stated due dates.

The course will utilize MyMathLab for unit exams and homework. The unit exams must be taken either 1) at the TC Testing Center located inside the TC Library (Academic Commons), 2) using the Respondus lockdown browser and camera test monitoring platform, or 3) at a proctored test setting if you are a dual credit student or if you live more than 50 miles out of town and have advance approval by the instructor for your proctor location based on the Proctor Requirements Policy. See the course shell in Moodle for details regarding each exam.

Proctor Requirements Policy

If you live within a 50 mile radius of Texarkana College, you must take your exams in the Texarkana College Testing Center located in the Texarkana College Library(Academic Commons), located on campus. Dual credit students must take their exams in their proctored high school location.

Students living outside the 50 mile radius of Texarkana College, and who do not wish to drive to the TC campus to take their tests, may use an approved proctored location which must be prearranged with the instructor. Students must find their own proctor and submit the required Remote Proctor Form to their instructor according to their timeline.

An acceptable proctor must be one of the following:

- Educational administrator or librarian at a community college, university, or high school
- Librarian at a public library
- Learning Center, ESO, or an officer of higher rank than the student, if in the military
- College, university, or private testing center

Note: Any cost for either the proctor or proctoring site is the full responsibility of the student. (This applies only if you are not taking tests at TC.)

Important Class Information:

Homework assignments must be completed by the due date @ 11:59pm of each week they are assigned for credit. Assignments turned in after the due date will be recorded as a zero. Students have **unlimited** attempts to complete each assignment before each due date. Assignments are located on your MML dashboard. After 3 attempts, select “similar exercise” for a new question. You can keep doing this as long as you would like until the due date or the desired grade is achieved.

Chapter tests are either IP address or password protected and will not be accessible unless the student is in your proctored setting (TC Testing Center/high school classroom/approved location). You may take a chapter test as soon as you see it posted in MML or when your proctor schedules it before the due date. Review Homework and Practice Tests for each test can be also found on MML under the “Assignments” button. **Review Homework will count for a grade in your homework. Practice Tests are for practice only and don’t affect your grade but are HIGHLY recommended.** The **comprehensive final** will be an online multiple choice exam.

*All due dates are final so please don’t ask for extra time. It is your responsibility to make sure your work is completed and tests are taken by the due date.

Calculators and the provided **College Algebra Formula Sheet** will be allowed on any course work. All work on tests will need to be shown on scratch paper numbered in appropriate sequence and legible and turned in with your test. Scratch paper and a graphing calculator are available if needed, you just have to ask.

A student may be **dropped** from this course for any of the following reasons:

- (1) Missing **3** major tests
- (2) Missing **3** or more weeks of homework
- (3) Any breach of conduct (see Student Handbook)

Absences/Makeup Policies

Absentee Policy

Texarkana College’s absentee policy allows instructors to withdraw a student from a course due to excessive absences. If a student leaves and returns during class or leaves the class before the class is over, he/she **may** be considered absent. Three tardies may be counted as one absence. Experience demonstrates that regular attendance enhances academic success. As such, students are expected to attend each meeting of their registered courses.

A student should not stop attending a class without formally withdrawing from the course by the institutions published Last Day for Students to Drop. If a student stops attending class after the published Last Day for Students to Drop, the student may receive a grade of “F” in the class. The instructor will submit the last date of attendance for students receiving a grade of “F” or “W”.

Withdrawal from a course(s) may affect a student’s current or future financial aid eligibility. Students should consult the Financial Aid Office to learn both short- and long-term consequences of a withdrawal.

Excused Absences

An absence is defined as any time you are not in class. A student’s absence due to school trips and/or school business will not be counted against a student’s allowable number of absences. Military duty and absences for Holy Days (FBD LEGAL) are covered in a separate section of the catalog and the student handbook. These are the only excused absences that are considered by Texarkana College. Responsibility for work missed for any absence is placed on the student. Instructors are required to allow students to make up work missed if the absence is due to military duty* or religious holy days when students follow the correct notification procedures. Instructors are not required to allow students to make up work for absences due to other reasons.

Maximum Allowable Absences

The maximum allowable absences refer to the maximum number of unexcused absences a student is allowed before a student may be dropped from the course. After official registration for a three credit hour academic class that meets two days a week for 16 weeks, the instructor may withdraw a student from the course if they exceed 4 absences. This means you may be dropped from the course for having 5 recorded absences. For a three credit hour academic class that meets two days a week for 8 weeks, the instructor may withdraw a student from the course if they exceed 2 absences. This means you may be dropped from the course for having 3 recorded absences.

Make-Up Policy

Students may make up missed tests if the absence is due to military duty or religious holy days when students notify the instructor prior to being absent. Faculty members are not obligated to provide opportunities for students to make-up missed assignments and tests as a result of a student's absence from class. It is the student's responsibility to communicate with the instructor regarding absences and missed course work. Any missed test will be recorded as a zero. I will replace your lowest test grade with the score from your comprehensive final exam, if that grade is higher. Students may have the homework due date extended for excused absences (See excused absences above). You will not receive credit for homework assignments after the due date has passed. At the end of the semester your lowest 3 homework grades will be dropped and will not count towards your homework average.

Tutoring and Extra Help

Texarkana College also offers free tutoring to all students, including online students, through the Math Lab located on the second floor of the Library. In order to use the tutoring available in the Math Lab, simply bring your Student ID with you to the library, go upstairs to the area labeled Math Lab and use your ID to sign in (on the designated sign-in computer), then work on any math work at the computers or tables in the Math Lab area. Check with the Math Lab for current hours of operation. **Note: Math Lab tutors will be available online through TEAMS.**

Class Behavior

Each student must respect the learning environment of others, therefore, there will be a zero tolerance policy for any behavior that is disruptive to classroom learning. This includes ANY use of vulgar language or rude behavior toward instructor or any other student in the class. This also includes disruptive cell phone usage during class! Please be considerate of others who are trying to learn by using your cell phone appropriately during class time. *Note: House Bill 1481 requires all public schools to ban or restrict cell phone use during the school day, thus, dual credit classes should not allow use of cell phones.*

Course Correspondence:

Correspondence from the instructor will be given through the student's Texarkana College email account. Announcements may also be posted on MML and sent to the email account you register with MyMathLab. Please check your email and MML regularly for updates and announcements. Grades and attendance will be posted on MyTC. It is the student's responsibility to check his/ her email, MyTC, and MyMathLab regularly for any information relating to the course.

Alternate Operations during Campus Closure

In the event of an emergency or announced campus closure due to a natural disaster or pandemic, Texarkana College may need to move to altered operations and course delivery methods. During this time, Texarkana College may opt to continue delivery of instruction through methods that include, but are not limited to: online learning management system (Jenzabar or Moodle), online conferencing through TEAMS, email messaging, and/or an alternate schedule. It is the responsibility of the student to monitor Texarkana College's website (www.texarkanacollege.edu) for instructions about continuing courses remotely, instructor email notifications on the method of delivery and course-specific communication, and Texarkana College email notifications for important general information.

COVID-19 Online/Virtual Environment Instructional Commitment

The ongoing Covid-19 situation will require that some course materials and instruction are provided through an online and/or virtual format. Even if all or a portion of a class was originally scheduled to meet face to

face, social distancing guidelines associated with Covid-19 will limit the number of students who are able to attend face to face classes in person simultaneously. Further, circumstances associated with Covid-19 could cause the college to be forced to shift completely to an online and/or virtual delivery at any time during the semester. While TC faculty members are committed to providing students the option of face to face instruction if possible, students should be prepared to continue their classes in an online and/or virtual environment if necessary. Texarkana College is committed to maintaining engaging, high quality instruction regardless of the delivery format.

Computer Requirement Policy

Students are required to have a computer with Internet access for classes. The computer must be an actual computer – smart phones, iPads, Androids, Chromebooks, etc., are not acceptable substitutes because they lack software compatibility necessary to complete all assignments and tests. Financial costs for the necessary equipment and internet access are the responsibility of the student.

Students needing to purchase a computer may do so through the Texarkana College Bookstore. Systems purchased through the bookstore meet or exceed all requirements, are competitively priced, and may be purchased using financial aid funds. If the system is purchased through another source, it is the student's responsibility to ensure the system meets all requirements.

Computer systems requirements:

- Webcam, microphone, and speakers or headphones
- Windows 10 or a recent version of Mac OS (minimum Sierra). Windows 10 S mode is not supported
- Hardware capable of running Microsoft Teams (free download) and supports multi-media playback
- Support for Chrome or Microsoft Edge – Note: Firefox, Safari, or other browsers may not work on all TC applications
- Able to run Microsoft Office which will be provided free to TC students
- Adobe Reader or another PDF viewer
- Antivirus software such as Windows Defender or another 3rd party anti-virus solution
- The Respondus Lockdown browser is used for taking tests; therefore, the system must be capable of running this software. Most newer systems that meet other specifications should work.

Students should regularly backup content to prevent loss of coursework due to hardware failure. Backup copies of documents and other coursework may be placed on OneDrive cloud storage. OneDrive is included free of charge for all TC students.

Prohibited Use of AI Tools

2. Paraphrasing and Translation: Using AI to paraphrase text or translate assignments is not permissible if it disguises the source material without proper acknowledgment. All work submitted should be in your own words and reflect your own understanding.

Disclosure and Citation

1. Acknowledgment: If any AI tools are used to aid in your learning process (e.g., for brainstorming or editing), their use must be disclosed in a brief statement in your submission.
2. Citation: All AI-assisted content must be properly cited according to the appropriate academic style guide mentioned in this syllabus.

Consequences of Misuse

Violating this policy will result in disciplinary actions consistent with the College’s Academic Integrity Policy, which may include failing the assignment, failing the course, or further disciplinary measures.

Copyrights

Students are required to comply with all local, state, federal, and international copyright laws and with College policies regarding the use of copyright-protected materials at Texarkana College. Whenever copyright-protected works are used and fair use does not clearly apply, Texarkana College requires students to obtain written permission from the copyright owner. Downloading, uploading, or transmitting files containing copyright-protected works without the permission of the copyright owner is prohibited by Texarkana College. A violation of this policy may subject the infringer to Texarkana College

disciplinary action, is illegal, infringes the copyright owner's rights, and may result in legal liability for the infringer and the College.

Most forms of expression, whether images, sculptures, designs, interactive works, books, movies, blogs, videos, music, or software, are protected by copyright law upon fixation in a tangible form. Expressive works are protected whether or not the work bears a copyright notice, and without regard to where the work is published or displayed. Copyright-protected works cannot be copied, distributed, adapted, performed, or displayed without the permission of the copyright owner. Any unauthorized use of copyright-protected work infringes the copyright owner's exclusive rights under copyright law.

A finding of copyright infringement does not require that the unauthorized use of the work be commercial, or that the infringer knows that the use is infringing. Even accidental copyright infringement creates legal liability. An infringer faces paying the copyright owner monetary damages, having the infringing work destroyed, and serving time or paying fines for certain criminal activities connected to copyright infringement. If the infringed work was registered with the U.S. Copyright office prior to infringement, the copyright owner may be entitled to collect anywhere from \$750 to \$150,000 per infringement in "statutory damages" from the infringer. Simply defending an accusation of copyright infringement is costly.

Fair use is a defense to copyright infringement that is intended to provide room for freedom of expression in the copyright law. Where an unauthorized use transforms, repurposes, comments upon, or criticizes the original copyright protected work, or is made for scholarly or educational purposes, the use may be a fair use and on-infringing of the copyright owner's rights. On the other hand, an unauthorized use of a copyright-protected work that merely reproduces the original work for a purpose similar to the original work's purpose is unlikely to be a fair use. The fair use defense to copyright infringement is a complex body of law and often requires a substantial expenditure of legal fees to succeed. Sharing music, movies, or software online without the permission of the copyright owner is not a fair use.

The Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DMCA) penalizes circumvention of technology use to prevent the unauthorized use of copyright-protected works. A violation of the DMCA may result in criminal penalties, including fines and imprisonment, and the defense of fair use does not apply to any provisions of the DMCA.
