Student Learning Outcomes for the Course

CRIJ 1306 Court Systems and Practices is the study of the judiciary in the criminal justice system; structure of the American court system; prosecution; right to counsel; pretrial release; grand juries; adjudication process; types and rules of evidence and sentencing.

Student Requirements for Completion of the Course and Due Dates

Instruction for this course will be accomplished through Web-based content and activities on the course homepage, audio/video presentations and weekly discussions between students and I posted on the course homepage. Students should read the text for the course prior to making a post or response. Student participation is essential to the learning process, and students are expected to answer questions and engage in professional debate. See the listed class schedule for assignment and test due dates.

Students are required to submit an essay including an introduction, body and conclusion in response to the Films on Demand video "Court, Trials, and Sentencing: Due Process". The video can be accessed from the link on the course home page. However, if you are unable to open the link it can be accessed from Films on Demand at <http://digital.films.com> using the USER ID: texarkana and PASSWORD: texas, and searching for the video title. The essay will be due on Monday of the following week and must be posted by midnight.

Students are required to submit five (5) brief responses to a Contemporary Criminal Justice issue during this semester. The response must state the issue being reported and the response of the student to the subject. Sources to consider using are newsprint, magazines, professional journals, television and/or radio news programs and internet news sites. A copy of the article must be submitted through attachment with the response or the article or news program must be cited. As a **bonus** students may submit up to six (6) more responses, however under no circumstances will more than one response be accepted per week.

You have the following possibilities for earning points:

- (1) 14 Chapter tests (100 points each) - 1,400 total points
 - (2) Court, Trials, and Sentencing: Due Process 100 total points
 - (2) 5 Contemporary Issues response (20 points each) - 100 total points
 - (3) Final Exam (100 points) - 100 total points
