Student Learning Outcomes for the Course

CRIJ 1301 Introduction to Criminal Justice will introduce the student to the history, philosophy, and development of the criminal justice system; crime and criminal justice definitions. The nature and impact of crime, overview of the criminal justice system, law enforcement, prosecution and defense, court system, trial process and corrections.

Student Requirements for Completion of the Course and Due Dates

Instruction for this course will be accomplished through Web-based content and activities on the course homepage, audio/video presentations and discussions between students and I posted on the course homepage. Students should read the text for the course prior to making a post or response. Student participation is essential to the learning process, and students are expected to answer questions and engage in professional debate. Students are expected to take notes for each exam and keep them in a folder till the end of the Semester. During the last two weeks of the semester, students will be given the opportunity to submit the folder as an email attachment or in person for five bonus points for each exam. Notes will occasionally be allowed for exams. See the listed class schedule for assignment and test due dates. All tests for this course will be taken through the web based course homepage.

(Exams are worth 75% of your final grade)

Students are required to submit an essay including an introduction, body and conclusion in response to the Films on Demand video "The Brain and Violence:

Secrets of Your Mind” the third week of the Semester. The video can be accessed from the link on the course home page. However, if you are unable to open the link it can be accessed from Films on Demand at <http://digital.films.com> using the USER ID: texarkana and PASSWORD: texas, and searching for the video title. The essay will be due on Monday of the following week and must be posted by midnight. (This assignment is worth 10% of your final grade)

Students are required to complete a **typed** Informative Essay about a substantial contemporary criminal justice issue that will be submitted as an assignment through the course homepage. The essay should be four to six double spaced pages long and consist of at least five or six paragraphs including an introduction, body and closing paragraphs. The essay must contain information from a minimum of three cited sources including but not limited to peer-reviewed articles, books and websites. Do not use Wikipedia as a source. The essay will be graded on content and a demonstration of investigative effort in developing and expressing the factual information on the issue. The topic for the assignment must be approved by Friday, February 12, 2016, before starting the essay. You will be allowed to turn the essay in once for a preliminary review and response before receiving a final grade, however the final copy must be submitted for grading no later than Friday, April 1, 2016.

(This assignment is worth 10% of your final grade)

Students are required to submit five (5) brief responses to a Contemporary Criminal Justice issue during this semester. The response must state the issue being reported and the response of the student to the subject. Sources to consider using are newsprint, magazines, professional journals, television and/or radio news programs and internet news sites. A copy of the article must be submitted through attachment with the response or the article or news program must be cited. As a **bonus** students may submit up to six (6) more responses, however under no circumstances will more than one response be accepted per week.

(This assignment is worth 5% of your final grade)
