Course Description: Knowledge, skills, and abilities essential to provide basic care to residents of long-term care facilities. Topics include resident's rights, communication, safety, observation, reporting and assisting residents in maintaining basic comfort and safety. Emphasis on effective interaction with members of the health care team, restorative services, mental health, and social services needs.

Student Learning Outcomes for the Course

To prepare nurse assistants with the knowledge, skills, and abilities essential for the provision of basic care to residents in long term care facilities. Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1) Discuss basic care to residents of long-term care facilities.
- 2) Communicate and interact effectively with residents and their families based on sensitivity to the psychosocial needs.
- 3) Discuss the rights of long-term care residents.
- 4) Provide safety and preventive measures in the care of residents.
- 5) Demonstrate skills in observing and reporting.
- 6) Assist residents in attaining and maintain maximum functional independence.
- 7) Function effectively as a member of the health care team.
- 8) Successfully demonstrate basic care skills in the skills lab.

Student Requirements for Completion of the Course

- 1) Quizzes: Quizzes will be randomly given. A quiz may or may not come with advanced notice.
- Homework and Assignments: Workbooks will be part of homework assignments as well as presentations. Assignments must be handed in on time to receive a grade. Presentations and Participation in class will be a part of the student's grade.
- 3) Mid-Term exam: The mid-term exam will be a comprehensive analysis of the subject matter taught in the first half of the semester.
- 4) Final exam: The final exam will be a comprehensive analysis of the subject matter taught for the entire course. Date for the final exam will be given in class at the end of the 2nd semester.

Nurse Assistant Course Registration Requirements

- A. All applicants must meet general admission requirements to Texarkana College through their high school Dual Credit program.
- B. All applicants must meet with counselor and complete requisite paperwork for participation in this class.
- C. A Dual Credit early admission form must be completed which means signatures of high school administration, student, and parent.
- D. Students must show proof of the following:
 - Current TB skin test or negative chest x-ray
 - Satisfactory criminal background check
 - Up to date immunizations required by the school district

Essential Physical Abilities

- A. Stand and walk for 6-8 hours/day.
- B. Walk for prolonged periods from one area to another over an 8 hour period.
- C. Bend, squat, and kneel.
- D. Assist in lifting and moving clients of all age groups and weights.
- E. Work with arms fully extended overhead.
- F. Use hand for grasping, pushing, pulling, and fine manipulation.
- G. Demonstrate eye/hand coordination for manipulation of equipment and the performance of procedures.
