Student Learning Outcomes for the Course

CRIJ 1306 Court Systems and Practices is the study of the judiciary in the criminal justice system; structure of the American court system; prosecution; right to counsel; pretrial release; grand juries; adjudication process; types and rules of evidence and sentencing.

Student Requirements for Completion of the Course and Due Dates

Instruction for this course will be accomplished through lecture, audio/video presentations, discussions and student participation. Students should read the text for the course prior to arrival in class, be attentive and take notes during lecture. Student participation is essential to the learning process, and students are expected to answer questions and engage in professional debate. See the listed class schedule for assignment and test due dates. Notes will occasionally be allowed for exams, however no notes will be permitted for makeup exams. Tests not made up within seven days will result in a ten point reduction in grade for the exam. Students are required to have Scantron sheets and #2 pencils for tests.

Students are required to submit a **hand-written** essay including an introduction, body and conclusion in response to the Films on Demand video "**Court, Trials, and Sentencing: Due Process**". The essay must be a minimum of one full page in length. The video can be accessed from the link on the course home page. However, if you are unable to open the link it can be accessed from Films on Demand at http://digital.films.com using the USER ID: texarkana and PASSWORD: texas, and

searching for the video title. The essay will be due on Monday of the following week in class. Please refer to Syllabus for date of assignment.

Students are required to complete a **typed** Informative Essay about a substantial contemporary criminal justice issue that will be submitted as an assignment through the course homepage. The essay should be four to six double spaced pages long and consist of at least five or six paragraphs including an introduction, body and closing paragraphs. The essay must contain information from a minimum of three cited sources including but not limited to peer-reviewed articles, books and websites. At least one source must be a peer-reviewed article. Do not use Wikipedia as a source. The essay will be graded on content and a demonstration of investigative effort in developing and expressing the factual information on the issue. Do not merely write a paper about your opinion on a subject. The topic for the assignment must be approved by Friday, February 08, 2019, before starting the essay. You will be allowed to turn the essay in once for a preliminary review and response before receiving a final grade if it is turned in before the due date and you request I review it by email, however the final copy must be submitted for grading no later than Friday, April 19, 2019 at 11:55pm.

Students are required to submit five (5) brief responses to a Contemporary Criminal Justice issue during this semester through the course homepage. The response must be a minimum of a full paragraph in length and state both the issue being reported and the response of the student to the subject. Sources to consider using are newsprint, magazines, professional journals, television and/or radio news programs and internet news sites. A copy of the article must be submitted through attachment with the response or the article or news program must be cited. The five required responses must be completed in the first ten weeks of the semester so watch for due dates. As a **bonus** students may submit up to six (6) more responses, however under no circumstances will more than one response be accepted per week.

Attendance Policy

Success in this course depends on your regular attendance and participation in class. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class period and students will be dropped from the course due to excessive unexcused absences. A student may be dropped from this course after their third absence. Three tardies constitute one absence. Any student arriving more than fifteen minutes late for class or

leaving early will be considered absent if prior approval has not been obtained by contacting me in my office by telephone at 903-823-3235 or email at stephen.gass@texarkanacollege.edu prior to the beginning of class. Approval will only be given in the case of unavoidable emergencies and you may be required to provide written proof.

A student absent due to school trips and/or school business will not have the absence counted against the student's allowable number of absences. A student absent for military duty or for recognized Holy Days will not have the absence counted against the student's allowable number of absences in accordance with the Texarkana College Student Handbook. In these circumstances students will be expected to satisfactorily complete the assignment and/or examination within a reasonable time after the absence. Class Conduct Policy

Cellular telephones and beepers must have the ringer turned off and not be visible in the class unless an emergency situation exists. This situation must be discussed with the instructor prior to class. If a student is caught text-messaging in class, the student may be dropped from the class. If a student's cell phone rings in class, the student will receive a warning and may be dropped from class after the second offense. Cellular telephone or electronic devices including smart watches should not be visible during any exam. Use of laptops or tablets is not allowed in class as it is a distraction to those around you.

The classroom should be treated as a professional environment and distractions should be kept to a minimum. Students should make arrangements with the instructor in advance if they need to leave class before dismissal or arrive late for class. Students that have made arrangements to leave class early should sit as close

to the door as possible. There will be a zero tolerance policy for any behavior that is disruptive to classroom learning. Professional debate is encouraged to enhance the learning environment however rude and vulgar behavior will not be tolerated. This includes ANY use of vulgar language or rude behavior toward instructor or any other student in the class. The field of Criminal Justice often involves topics that some might find controversial including but not limited to political and religious beliefs. Topics discussed in class are for an educational purpose and students must remain civil and respectful. Students asked to leave the class for improper behavior will be dropped from the course.
