Student Learning Outcomes for the Course

CRIJ 1301 Introduction to Criminal Justice will introduce the student to the history, philosophy, and development of the criminal justice system; crime and criminal justice definitions. The nature and impact of crime, overview of the criminal justice system, law enforcement, prosecution and defense, court system, trial process and corrections.

Student Requirements for Completion of the Course and Due Dates

This course is designed as a dual credit course, which means that you will be responsible for participation and interaction with myself Mrs. Shannon and other participants in the course on a weekly basis. The specific scheduled activities (exams, essay and responses) must be completed on a scheduled basis. This is not a self-paced course and failure to complete assignments on a timely basis will result in being counted absent and a zero for a grade. Student participation is essential to the learning process, and students are expected to answer questions and engage in professional debate. See the listed class schedule for assignment and test due dates. If you are unable to complete an assignment, it is important that you communicate with me on coursework related to Texarkana College in addition to Mrs. Shannon at Texas High School. Since this is a dual credit course, there will be assignments that you complete for credit at Texas High that will not be reflected in your grade for this course at Texarkana College.

Students are required to submit an essay of approximately one page in length including an introduction, body and conclusion in response to the Films on Demand

video "<u>Court, Trials, and Sentencing: Due Process</u>". The video can be accessed from the link on the course home page. However, if you are unable to open the link it can be accessed from Films on Demand at http://digital.films.com using the USER ID: texarkana and PASSWORD: texas, and searching for the video title.

Students are required to complete a **typed** Informative Essay about a substantial contemporary criminal justice issue that will be submitted as an assignment through the course homepage. The essay should be four to six double spaced pages long and consist of at least five or six paragraphs including an introduction, body and closing paragraphs. The essay must contain information from a minimum of three cited sources including but not limited to peer-reviewed articles, books and websites. At least one source must be a peer-reviewed article. Do not use Wikipedia as a source. The essay will be graded on content and a demonstration of investigative effort in developing and expressing the factual information on the issue. Do not merely write a paper about your opinion on a subject. The topic for the assignment must be approved before starting the essay. You will be allowed to turn the essay in once for a preliminary review and response before receiving a final grade if it is turned in before the due date and you request I review it by email, however the final copy must be submitted for grading no later than Friday, April 24, 2020.

Students are required to submit five (5) brief responses to a Contemporary Criminal Justice issue during this semester. The response must be a minimum of a full paragraph in length and state both the issue being reported and the response of the student to the subject. Sources to consider using are newsprint, magazines, professional journals, television and/or radio news programs and internet news sites. A copy of the article must be submitted with the written response or the article or news program must be cited. As a **bonus** students may submit up to six (6) more responses, however under no circumstances will more than one response be accepted per week.
