General Learning Activities	Analysis of historic theatrical periods and genres with Collaborative Base. Groups. After being introduced to periods and genres (realism, symbolism, expressionism, French avant-garde, etc.) each group of students will be given a period to research. The students will divide the assignments and work individually on a portion of the assignment but must also work collaboratively to analyze sources and share information. The assignment includes a group presentation in the form of Power Point or project board, a 3 page analysis over playwrights and works within the style assigned. The students will then put together a presentation for the entire class that must all members of their group, as well as multi-media.
