Quotation Marks

What IS a quotation mark?

A quotation mark is one of a pair of punctuation marks "" or '' used primarily to indicate the beginning and the end of a direct quotation.

Quotation marks are also used to punctuate titles and to denote special words in a sentence.

Study the following slides to learn the rules for correctly using quotation marks. Work to master these rules so that you feel confident incorporating them into your writing.

<u>Rule 1:</u>

Use quotation marks to punctuate some titles.

- "Two Friends" (short story)
- "New Car Designs" (newspaper article)
- "The New Admissions Game" (magazine article)
- "Multiculturalism and the Language Barrier" (lecture title)
- "The New Admissions Game" (magazine article)
- "Reflections on Advertising" (chapter in a book)
- "Blink" (television episode from Doctor Who)
- "Annabel Lee" (short poem)

Rule 2:

Use quotation marks to show that a word is being discussed as a word.

- A commentary on the times is that the word "honesty" is now preceded by "oldfashioned."
 - Notice the placement of the quotation marks.



Use quotation marks to indicate that a word or phrase is directly quoted.

She said that she was "incensed."



Use quotation marks to indicate that a word is slang.

My daughter had to explain to me that calling a movie "wicked" meant that it was awesome, and we should go see it.



Use quotation marks to indicate that a word is being used in a humorous or ironic way.

In an attempt to be popular, he works very hard at being "cute."

<u>Rule 6:</u>

Use quotation marks before and after a direct quotation - a person's exact words.

- "If you put forth your best effort, you will be successful in class," Professor Ramage told her students on the first day of the semester.
- Professor Ramage told her students on the first day of the semester, "If you put forth your best effort, you will be successful in class."
 - Notice the placement of the quotation marks.

Punctuating Direct Quotes Always place periods and commas inside quotation marks.

"Dr. Slaughter wants you to have liquids, Will," Mama said anxiously. "He said not to give you any sold food tonight."

-- Olive Ann Burns, Cold Sassy Tree

Notice the placement of the punctuation with the direct quote.

Placement of Exclamation Points or Question Marks

Place an exclamation mark or question mark inside quotation marks when it punctuates both the main sentence and the quotation' place it outside when it punctuates the main sentence.

"Do you often ask yourself, "What shall I be?"
"Did he really say, "Finish this by tomorrow"?
Notice the placement of the end punctuation.
