Class Learning Environment/Policies

This class will be an intellectually engaging, open, active learning environment. Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, a student will:

- 1. Explain the origin and development of constitutional democracy in the United States.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the federal system.
- 3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of the federal government.
- 5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in the political system.
- 6. Analyze the election process.
- 7. Describe the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
- 8. Analyze issues and policies in United States politics.

Computer Requirement Policy

Students are required to have a computer with Internet access for classes. The computer must be an actual computer – smart phones, iPads, Androids, etc., are not acceptable substitutes because they lack software compatibility necessary to complete all assignments and tests. Antivirus software such as Windows Defender or another 3rd party anti-virus solution Respondus/Lockdown browser must be installed; it is free for TC students through the provided link. Exams are taken in the Moodle LMS through Respondus.

Students should regularly backup content to prevent loss of coursework due to hardware failure. Backup copies of documents and other coursework may be placed on OneDrive cloud storage. OneDrive is included free of charge for all TC students. A list of Internet service providers can be found on the TC website.

Student Assessment and Grading Scale

<u>Exams</u> – Exams are weighted equally and are worth **40 percent of the final grade**. Exams will include multiple choice, short discussion, and essay questions. Any material from the textbook, assignments, class lectures, and discussions may show up on an exam. If a student misses an exam, the professor will determine **if** a makeup is allowed upon written email request from the student. Exams are timed and are taken on Moodle with Respondus/Lockdown browser.

<u>Assignments, papers, forums, and quizzes</u> – These components are worth **60 percent of the final grade.**
