

Syllabus: Art Appreciation **Course Number:** ART 1301 **Instructor Information**

Course Description:

In Art Appreciation students will study what art is, the different art periods, the artists and media associated with each period. The elements and principles of art are studied through mini-projects composed in a Design Notebook and in other lab projects.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students will learn different artistic time periods and the artists and media associated with each period.
- 2. Students will express opinions/knowledge of artist/art periods through summaries.
- 3. Complete study questions for each required unit.
- 4. Student will complete a lab notebook that incorporates the elements of design, demonstrating their ability to follow directions and interpret their knowledge from textbook and lectures.
- 5. Students will experiment with various media concentrating on artists and styles from lectures and visual materials.

Student Assessment

Grades will be taken from unit tests, quizzes, design notebooks, and lab projects Grades are also influenced by creativity, attitude, meeting class on time, attendance, cooperation, keeping work area and the student work areas clean.

Unit tests and design notebooks are scored at 100 points each. All other quizzes, projects, and extra credit are evaluated at the discretion of the individual instructor.

Audio visual materials will be shown in conjunction with material in the textbook. While watching a video write down one thing (you may write more if you wish) for each of the following:

- 1. Look for something you did not already know about the *subject*.
- 2. Look for something that was of interest to you.
- 3. Look for something you did not like about the *subject*.

Please put the name of the video, date, section and your name on the paper.

Extra credit is available from art exhibits, museums and special events designated by the individual instructor.

Grade scale varies with each individual instructor.
